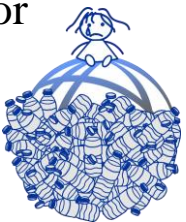

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Lessons learnt and takeaways

- Circular Economy is a **responsibility** of all of us
- Decouple the fight of the pandemic from the overproduction of new plastics through concrete **circular economy instruments**
- **Reduce, reuse, remanufacture, recycle**, instead of producing new polymers
- Within the 4Rs, prioritise **low-energy consumption activities** such as reducing, reusing and remaking
- **Environmental protection** is not only a matter of good will, but an essential tool to **fight against poverty**
- Eco-poverty dimensions and SDGs: Environmental Mainstreaming Approach is needed to make Circular Economy concretely work
- Public policies are the main **driver** for circular economy to scale up: **circular businesses** must have a competitive advantage over linear economy businesses (i.e. green taxation may help to fund innovations)
- Avoid “one solution fits all” approach. Need for **top-down** and **bottom-up** initiatives **suited to the context** to work in synergy.
